Prayers for Health

This month Haiti was invaded by a mosquito-borne viral disease called Chikunguyna which first appeared in Southern Tanzania in 1952. Since then it has moved through Africa and Asia, and most recently into the Caribbean. Unlike Malaria, Chikunguyna is generally not fatal. It does cause high fever, acute fatigue, nearly unbearable joint pain, and an itchy rash. As of yet, there is no cure for the disease, so it is treated symptomatically with Tylenol and Paracetamol and by keeping the patient hydrated. The best prevention is to avoid getting bit by using insect repellent, screened rooms, mosquito netting, wearing long sleeves and pants, and removing all standing water. By the third week of its entrance into Haiti, the government was reporting the number of cases near 5,000. The reliability of these numbers is suspect since many will never seek professional treatment. We anticipate some heavy weeks in the

clinic for Leah and would greatly appreciate your prayers for her as well as for the members of our staff, students, missionaries, and community here who are recovering from it.
